SUBJECT: Increase Inclusion in your Child Care Program - Project Include Kits are now available from ECCLPS!

<u>Project Include</u> (en español) offers all licensed child care programs in Colorado the opportunity to build more inclusive learning environments through simple modifications and adaptive equipment.

There is no cost or application to participate in Project Include – all Colorado licensed child care programs are eligible. Simply <u>fill out this interest form</u> (<u>en español</u>) to get started.

Interested programs will start by completing the Introduction to Universal Design training on the Colorado Shines Professional Development Information System (PDIS). After the training is complete, Project Include offers Universal Design and Inclusion Kits for programs to borrow and experiment with adaptive equipment. Each kit contains toys, tools, and materials that can be used to increase inclusion and participation by young children with delays and disabilities. The kits are focused on one of four developmental areas: Communication & Literacy, Behavior & Cognition, Fine & Gross Motor, Vision & Hearing.

We are excited to announce that Project Include's Universal Design and Inclusion Kits are now available to be borrowed directly from ECCLPS. After completion of the Introduction to Universal Design training, we will contact you with instructions for requesting your kit.

In addition, after programs have borrowed and explored at least one Universal Design & Inclusion Kit, they are eligible to receive customized coaching from our team of experts and free tools and materials to keep that will more permanently support inclusion of all children.

Praying Mantis (Mantid)



- *They are large insects, often 2 3 inches long or more. Some species can reach a length of up to 18 inches! They are closely related to termites and cockroaches. They are found on every continent except Antarctica.
- *There are more than 2,500 mantid species! They get their name from their legs, because they do appear to be praying.
- *They are masters of camouflage, and can molt to change their color to better match their environment. Some look just like the plants where they hunt and reside. Examples are the orchid mantis, the conehead mantis, and the dead leaf mantis.
- *They are carnivores and very beneficial insects in the garden! Common food items include insects (crickets, mites, mosquitoes, grasshoppers, and beetles), spiders, invertebrates, and will also eat small reptiles, amphibians, and small birds like hummingbirds. (Unfortunately they do not discriminate, and will eat beneficial insects as well.) They are not dangerous to humans, and even though they may bite if threatened, they are non-venomous, and the bite is rarely painful. Some of the creatures that prey on them include frogs, lizards, spiders, hornets, ants, birds, and bats.
- *They are able to turn their head 180 degrees, and are the only insect that can do so. They have excellent vision and can detect motion from as far as 60 feet away because they see in 3D. They have five eyes, 2 that face forward, and three smaller eyes that only detect light and motion. Some species also have one ear that is located on its abdomen, just in front of its hind legs.
- *Some species engage in sexual cannibalism, where the female will bite off the male's head and consume it. The male will continue mating as it dies. (Other creatures that engage in this practice are some beetles, crickets, grasshoppers, scorpions, and spiders.) Once she lays her eggs, she dies soon after.
- *Eggs are laid in a protective case, which provides a safe and secure environment for the eggs to develop and mature. Young are hatched in the spring once temperatures reach 75 80 degrees for at least 10 15 days.
- *They begin eating right away, and molt several times before reaching adulthood over the summer.
